I'm just wondering if someone will rear up pretty soon and call me a hobby rider on church government, since I've been doing so much talking and writing about the development of a godly, consecrated, qualified, working eldership. I do not want to be an extremist on any subject, but when I see stress placed upon development of young men as preachers and the most important function of the local church—the eldership being completely neglected, it makes me realize that we will either have to change our attitude and tactics, or there will be trouble ahead.

God's ideal for a congregation is one in which all work with whole hearts for His glory. Such a congregation needs the guidance of sincere and sober men. Most of the troubles in past years could have been averted if elders had been at the helm of the churches and exercised the scriptural admonition, "If any come and bring not this doctrine—RECEIVE HIM NOT!" This wishy-washy, wire-walking, compromising which some supposed elders have done in the past must be stamped out. It's our duty to preach and teach God's whole plan. Are you with us in it? A few of you have been kind enough to write and say you are! Were you one of them?

**Scriptural Elders**

NUMBER 3

The qualifications and work of the eldership are set forth in full in chapter three of First Timothy; chapter one of Titus, and are incidentally referred to in such places as 1 Peter 5: 1-4 and Acts 20: 28-31. (Turn and read these places and notice how nice and fresh the pages of your Bible are where they are found). Before we notice said qualifications, we should pause to consider an oft-repeated, age-old question, "Do the men who are appointed need to have all of these qualifications?"

In reply I ask you which ones they do not need to have. Will you select the ones in the catalogue God gave that they must have, then list the ones they may have, and in a third column list the ones they do not need. Please send the same to me, because I know of a lot of men who can be appointed to the eldership right away if they don't need all of the qualifications.

An old brother who publicly announced once that he could answer any question asked him about the Bible, if they'd give time, was up demonstrating his superior wisdom to a class in a little rural church not long ago. He ranted loud and long that a man did not need to have all of the qualifications, no person in the world would meet such a requirement, and since God wanted elders in every church, we should pick out the ones that came nearest to meeting the requirements and slap them in office forthwith and at once. (He wanted the office). A school teacher sitting in class said, "Do I understand that if a person has all of these qualifications but one you'd appoint that individual to the eldership?" "Absolutely". "Well", said the teacher, "we have a sister here who has all of them except one—she's not the husband of one wife—how about putting her in?" The old brother gulped a time or two, and is still thinking, trying to get the correct answer to that one!

The Constitution of the United States sets forth certain qualifications for a president. How many of those does the man need who is elected to that office? How many can he leave out? If an elder does not need all of the qualifications set forth, then why didn't God just have out the ones he didn't need? If they

are not needed are they really qualifications?

What does the Bible mean when it says "A bishop then MUST be . . ." (I Timothy 3:2)? What does it mean when it says, He MUST have a . . ." (I Timothy 3:7)? What does it mean when it says, "Likewise MUST the deacons be . . ." (I Timothy 3:8)? What does it mean when it says, "Even so MUST their wives be . . ." (I Timothy 3:11)? Does it mean, perhaps, maybe, or it's just up to you? Did you note that in your reading of the qualifications in I Timothy, that the first one is preceded by the word "must" and the last one is also? There MUST be a reason for that! Woe to the man who ignores the teaching of God's word, having men's persons in admiration because of advantage, and who appoints unqualified individuals to this sacred office! Better for such a man were it that he had never been born, than to saddle about the neck of Christ's body a dead weight which will hold back the church from making any progress.

Then one interposes the thought that no man on earth will be found having all of these requirements! If that be true we have been making a mighty empty boast about being Christians. Few requirements are held forth for an elder that are not also exacted of every child of God. And if we have none who are qualified, we had better get busy and qualify them. That would be infinitely better than just jerking up anyone who came along and putting him into the office to the life-long detriment of the church. But God knew what was in man. He gave us qualifications that men could meet, he wasn't talking about angels. Still, it's really a wonder when someone does meet these divinely authorized principles, considering how little teaching, preaching and writing is done concerning them. When men develop into preachers they generally do so because the church trains them for that work, but elders often develop not because of the church but in spite of it. The local church is the school of Christ. It's sole development function is not in the realm of evangelism. It is to develop everyone in the congregation to the place where he can best carry on the work for which he is best fitted. Some evangelists would not make good elders at

all. Some elders could not have developed into evangelists at all. God hath set each in the body as it hath pleased him! Let's stress the development of godly, consecrated bishops as we stress the development of young preachers and in ten years from now we will see the fruit of our efforts in a strong bulwark of defense in every city, town and hamlet where the church has been established. That impregnable defense will be a godly eldership standing out against all of the innovations and departures which arise.

God does not expect any man to have all of these qualifications in a superlative degree, for that would leave no room for improvement. He expects an elder to grow in grace, knowledge and Christian zeal as well as everyone else. But he does demand that an elder possess all of the qualifications in SOME degree, that his life may be well-rounded and his ability to superintend or govern be clearly demonstrated. It's not a question of "Who do we have that comes nearest to having all of the requirements?" but rather, "Who can we develop until he has all of the qualifications?" Let's not appoint anyone who doesn't meet God's requirements. He knew what he wanted and said so. Now listen to him and do what he says. (I'll see you next month)—W. Carl Ketcherside.
