# "Lights in the World"

As each day passes, the world grows darker. We, like the Philippian brethren of old, live in "the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world" (Phil. 2:15). While the world sinks deeper into the dark abyss of depravity and perversity, we must uphold the light of Christ at all costs. How do we keep the flame of Jesus burning bright when so many seek to extinguish it? Paul answers this question in the verses surrounding Phil. 2:15.

"How do we keep the flame of Jesus burning bright when so many seek to extinguish it?"

He first commands us to "work out your own salvation with fear and trembling" (Phil. 2:12). This work rests upon each individual member. We work out our salvation by casting aside our old life with its recesses of darkness and fill our resurrected life with the light of Christ. Jesus "called [us] out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Pet. 2:9), and expects us to "walk as children of light," having "no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness" (Eph. 5:8, 11). In other words, a child of light will "put off...the old man which grows

corrupt according to the deceitful lusts," and "put on the new man which was created according to God, in true righteousness and holiness" (Eph. 4:22, 24). For the church to effectively broadcast the light of Christ, each individual member must drive out their own hindering works of darkness.

Paul's next command is, "Do all things without complaining and disputing" (Phil. 2:14-15). Complaints and disputes destroy congregations. They reflect ingratitude and selfishness while introducing divisive elements. A divided congregation cannot manifest Christ's spirit. In contrast to this attitude, consider verses 3-5: "Let nothing be done through selfish ambition or conceit, but in lowliness of mind let each esteem others better than himself. Let each of you look out not only for his own interests, but also for the interests of others. Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus...." A congregation's selfless spirit of service promotes the light of Christ. "By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (Jn. 13:35).

## "[hold] fast the word of life"

To conclude, Paul exhorts us to "[hold] fast the word of life" (Phil. 2:16). One major contributor to the world's growing darkness is the presence of deceiving doctrines. Pantheism, paganism, atheism, and corruptions of Jesus Christ's gospel swirl about us. To navigate the storm, we must hold firm to the doctrine revealed in the New Testament. Instability appears when we surrender to the storms of false Paul says we "should no longer be children, tossed to and fro with every wind of doctrine" (Eph. 4:14). Instead, we must hold fast to the gospel, turn a deaf ear to the confusion around us, and uphold the light of Christ. "Therefore, brethren, stand fast and hold the traditions which you were taught, whether by word or our epistle" (2 Thess. 2:15).

My brethren, as the darkness deepens around us we should not despair! Rather, let us labor to uphold the light of Christ until our death or His return. Prepare your soul for eternity, maintain an environment of goodwill and peace, hold fast to the word of God. One thing is certain: the darker this world grows, the brighter Christ's light will shine!

# This Quarter's Close-Up: Colorado Springs

A history of the body of Christ meeting at 950 E. Cimarron St. in Colorado Springs

On June 30, 1906, John Beswick deeded to the congregation, for the whopping sum of one dollar, the property upon which the meeting place at 950 E. Cimarron now stands. It is fascinating to contemplate this transaction 102 years later.

On August 1, 1876, one hundred years after the United States of America established its independence from England, and 73 years after the acquisition of the Louisiana Territory, Colorado became the 38<sup>th</sup> state of the Union. Within 30 years after that, there was a congregation of the Lord's people establishing themselves in the city of Colorado Springs.

On March 17, 1907, Hamlin Brown of Hustead, Colorado, and Anna Kemp of Colorado Springs, were married. To their union on August 9, 1908 was born a baby girl (my great aunt), Edith (Brown) Russell. I remember my great grandmother Brown, and I certainly remember my Aunt Edith. It would be a blessing to have her copious notes on EVERYTHING that ever occurred with this congregation over the many years to consult as I write today! Edith could tell you about the days when the church met in a tent while the building was being constructed. It was in 1915-five years after Edith's sister Emma ("Ella") (Brown) Spence (2/15/1910–10/19/1986) was born --that the work on the building was completed. In those days there were neither classrooms, nor any access via stairs to the basement; no furnace, no plumbing, just a single pot bellied stove for heat.

The Browns apparently spent a little time further west, because the next daughter born was Cleeda (Brown) Polster, on April 11, 1915, in Azusa, California. In her 93 years, my Aunt Cleeda has seen a lot of coming and going, a lot of rising and falling with the church. Cleeda remembers

various evangelists who have worked with the congregation in times past: Brother Smith from Washington; Brother Harper from Riverside, California; Orville Webb; Fritz Chesly; Roy

Harris; Roy Loney; C. R. Turner; and Tom Dennis. Cleeda also remembers my great grandfather, Arthur Marion Wright: carpenter, preacher, good man, and father of ten children. Cleeda remembers the two week protracted meetings, the young people's meetings, and the vacation Bible studies that these men used to conduct with the group. Evangelists working with the church in more recent years: Thomas Woody; Rick Sparks; Jay Graham; Carl Hunter; Louis Garbi; Wade Stanley; John Morris; Kevin Ferguson; Dan Huff; Doug Twaddell; and myself, Steven Wright.

On August 12, 2006, I stepped into the role of interim leadership, specific to the evangelist (Tit. 1:5). This was done at the initiative of the congregation.

The current membership of the congregation consists of seven souls: Jeanette Dorland, whose late husband Jack Campbell served as an elder with the congregation; their daughter Cynthia Minick, who faithfully serves the congregation in multiple capacities; Jack Campbell's first cousin Betty McDaniel, who became a member of the body in September 2007; Art and Lois Criswell, who first came to the congregation in 1949; Cleeda Polster; and the youngest of the Brown girls, my dear maternal grandmother, Carol (Brown) DuCharme. Carol was born to Hamlin and Anna on December 24, 1921, in Colorado Springs. She, like her sister Cleeda, and the dearly departed Edith, has been attending at 950 E. Cimarron all of her life.

In this great nation of ours, how many congregations of the churches of Christ can we point to that are 100 years old or older? For 950 E. Cimarron, if this world and our nation continue, we hope to see at least 100 more years to come. I commend these brethren for their fortitude and their faithful resolve. It is a struggle right now, but we all hope for brighter days ahead. In the words of Cleeda: "In my lifetime, I have seen this congregation cycle down and come back up many times; we are praying that it will come back up again."

My parents, Lee and Carol Jean (Orrell) Wright, both grew up in this congregation. In times past, many more of my relatives have been a part of the group as well. I myself have many fond memories of summer visits there. Indeed my heart goes out to this place and its people.

May God be with us all in strength!
